# HOUGHTON-LE-SPRING STREET GUIDES: DURHAM ROAD



ONE OF THE MAJOR routes out of Sunderland centre is the A690, or Durham Road as it is aptly known for it runs from Sunderland to the historic City of Durham. A stretch of this ancient road passes through Houghton-le-Spring however it is now off the beaten track since the opening of the A690 dual-carriageway in the summer 1970.

In the days before motorcars, the old Durham Road would have brought many a weary traveller to Houghton, from either direction. The town's numerous inns offered refreshments and a comfortable bed for the night – not forgetting stables where yours horses could have rest.

In those days, Durham Road was a lane surrounded by fields and it is on one of those fields that Houghton Cemetery opened on March 1st 1892, at the southern end of the town. The cemetery grounds, timber clad lodge and iron railings cost £4,000, about £250,000 in today's money. Prior to this, burials were in the Church's detached burial ground, known as Houghton Hillside Cemetery, which had opened in 1854 but was vastly overcrowded. When the new cemetery opened, the Local Board of Health Attempted to close Hillside Cemetery, however the Rector, Rev John Grey, objected as the new cemetery had not been consecrated. The Local



Board continued to refuse to consecrate the new cemetery and the Church was left with no other option than to extend dilapidated Hillside Cemetery, which it did in 1894. This was despite neighbouring Hetton-le-Hole's municipal cemetery having a consecrated section and it was only resolved when Houghton Cemetery was finally consecrated 1907. In the 1930s, cemetery was extended to the east, seeing the burial ground extend from Durham Road up to Hetton Road.



Durham Road had other significant

buildings built alongside it. St Michael's Roman Catholic Church opened for divine service on November 7<sup>th</sup> 1837 having been designed by Ignatius Bonomi, an architect who worked on Lambton Castle, Durham Castle and Durham Prison. The Church originally occupied the upper floor with the ground floor used as a school, however a detached school was built later and has since been rebuilt on the opposite side of Durham Road.

Nearer the town centre stands the former malting house of the Robinson Brothers brewery, which was converted into luxury apartments in 1999. Indeed, the Robinson family owned many of the properties along Durham Road, particularly those known as Imperial Buildings, which also housed the Kings Hall, the one-time dole office and place where residents enlisted during the Second World War.

Like many of Houghton's other streets, Durham Road has seen great changes over the years. One of the biggest is the change of name for the section in the very centre of Houghton. This became known as the Broadway when it was widened in the 1950s and landscaped at the time the Urban District Council acquired the nearby Rectory grounds for use as a public park.
